1. Public Participation

Jack Wright, Editor-in-Chief, Nutmeg Publishing, raised concerns about the ongoing fiscal viability of the Nutmeg yearbook due to insufficient student fees.

2. Chairman's Report

(a) Matters Outstanding

Board Chair Toscano recognized this year's recipients of the prestigious Goldwater Scholarship, which was established by the U.S. Congress and supports undergraduate students majoring in mathematics, science, engineering, or research psychology. The undergraduate students are: Daniel D'Souza, Ashly Gasior, and Mackenzie Robillard all of whom are enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and in the Honors Program.

Board Chair Toscano acknowledged the State of Connecticut proclamation that April 15, 2026, be recognized as Petra Clark-Dufner Day, in recognition of her distinguished career of sustained leadership in education, health equity, and workforce development at UConn Health. This proclamation honors her over 30 years of service strengthening access to health care services as an Assistant Professor in the School of Medicine and Director of the Connecticut Area Health Education Center based at UConn Health.

Board Chair Toscano recognized Trustee Sean Dunn's service, commitment, and leadership as the undergraduate student representative on the Board for the past two years. He noted that Trustee Dunn is graduating on May 9 as an Honors Scholar in Biomedical Engineering.

4. CGS 1-210(b)(10): Records, tax returns, reports and statements exempted by federal law or the general statutes or communications privileged by the attorney-client relationship, marital relationship, clergy-penitent relationship, doctor-patient relationship, therapist-patient relationship or any other privilege established by the common law or the general statutes, including any such records, tax returns, reports or communications that were created or made prior to the establishment of the applicable privilege under the common law or the general statutes.

WHY MEDICAL SCHOOLS INCREASE TUITION

Tuition increases are not about “making profit.”

Medical schools are expensive to operate, and several pressures can push costs up over time.

- Annual operating costs include:
 - Curriculum development/reform & delivery
 - Learning platforms, assessment tools, and electronic resources
 - Maintaining sim, other labs, standardized patient and clinical skills centers, equipment, technology, etc.
 - Clinical teaching retention and expansion
 - Support staff for the curriculum, accreditation requirements, student assessments, administration, etc.
 - Basic Science and Clinical Faculty and staff salaries
- Recent investments in teaching quality and student support
 - New simulation and anatomy technologies
 - Expanded wellness advising, mental health resources, Learning Center, tutoring
 - Accreditation costs of the SOM
- External pressures
 - Inflation has increased
 - Salaries and fringe costs increased
 - State funding has decreased
